Planning Your Summer Activities

Summer, the season that kids look forward to and parents often dread. Finding activities to keep kids engaged outside of their screens can be difficult. Locating the right program or camp for a good price that keeps them constantly moving can be difficult. And then you have to think about what activities you can do inexpensively as a family when camp is not is session.

Here are some things to look for in a day camp for your children:

- 1. Is there an early registration discount?
- 2. What types of activities are they offering and are those costs included in the weekly expense? Does it vary by age?
- 3. Are meals provided? If so, which ones?
- 4. What is the earliest drop off time and the latest you can pick up?
- 5. What do you do if you need to take a week off? What's the cost, if any? How much time do the need to know ahead of time?

Many day camps already have registration open and will have limited spots, so start your research now. A good website to use is <u>www.kiddingaroundgreenville.com</u> and then click on Summer Camp Spartanburg. This website includes a description of the camp, the age requirements, registration dates and you can click on the link to find out more specific information.

Now, what about family activities that will not cost an arm and a leg? Let your children help plan those events. Here are some ideas:

1. Spartanburg County Libraries offer a free summer reading program with rewards and tons of events for all ages.



Paradise Lanes allows kids to bowl 2 free games everyday. You
just need to sign up on their website. Adults can purchase a
discounted pass as well.



3. Look for an *outdoor movie*. Drayton Mills and Barnet Park have one planned each month. They are free just bring your snacks and something to sit on.

4. Visit one of our many parks in the county. Barnet Park, Tyger River Park and Airport Park have splash pads as well as playgrounds that are open to the public.

- 5. Enjoy a picnic under the trees or around the ponds at *Miliken Arboretum*.
- 6. Take a walk on many of the trails in Spartanburg like the Mary Black Rail Trail, Cottonwood Trail, or Hatcher Gardens, or hike Croft State Park.

One of the best ways to end your activities is to eat out as a family but it can mean a big expense. Here are some low cost or free places that kids can eat. Please remember these deals can change at any time so you may want to call ahead before going.

- **Daily**—*Cici's Pizza* offers a kids eat free with every paid adult buffet. At Wade's Family Restaurant, kids eat for \$2.71 in the dining room.
- **Tuesdays**—1 Free meals for kids with an adult purchase at *Denny's*, *IHOP*, *Pizza Inn*, *McAlister's Deli*, *Capri's*, *Moe's Original BBQ and Chicken Salad Chick*. *Burrito Hub* offers \$1.50 tacos. *Rapid Fire Pizza* offers \$1.99 Kids Night and *Wayback Burger* offers a \$.99 kids meal with the purchase of a Signature Double Burger, fries, and drink. Dine in only.
- Wednesdays—1 Free Kids Meal with adult meal purchase—Firehouse Subs
- Saturdays—1 Free Kids Meal with adult purchase—Brickhouse Pizzeria & Grill
- Sundays—Dickey's BBQ Pit offers 1 free kids meals with a \$10 purchase. Firehouse Subs offers 1 free kids meal with adult meal purchase. Jersey Mike's Subs offers a \$.99

Understanding your Escrow Statement

Every year, mortgage servicers analyze the escrow for each mortgage. They are looking at three things: 1.) Current balance in escrow account, 2.) The cost of homeowners insurance for the following year and 3.) The cost of property taxes for the following year. They also want to make sure there is a minimum of two months of extra escrow in reserve. The servicer is required to send a statement of the changes to your escrow 21 days before the new payment is due.

While the amount you are required to pay for your mortgage does not change, the amount for your escrow changes every year. This increase is due to changes in your insurance premium or property taxes. Insurance and taxes are usually the cause of the escrow payment change along with any deficiency in the account that will prevent it from having the 2 months extra in the account. This year, property taxes may have increased because the county reassessed properties for 2024, causing an increase for many.

Program Services is reviewing the escrow analysis statements you received to be able to review the changes in your payment with you and determine if there is something that can done to decrease that payment. If you would like help understanding your statement or determining how the increase will affect you financially, please call Program Services for an appointment to review it with you. We can be reached at 864-591-2221 ext. 100. Our goal is to keep you in your home and not jeopardize your other finances at the same time.

Spring Home Maintenance Tips

The first days of Spring are already here. Flowers are beginning to grow and bloom. The grass is turning green again. Time for some maintenance inside and outside of your home.



HVAC Maintenance

- Remember to change your air filter monthly.
- Clean your return air grill that holds your filter when you are dusting as well as your other vents.

• Keep the AC on even if you are leaving for a few days. Maintaining a consistent temperature keeps your system from having to work harder than necessary. Summer is also very humid and your AC help maintain the levels of humidity in your home to

prevent mold and mildew.

- Remove any grass, weeds, or yard debris from around your outdoor unit so that the air can exchange freely.
- If your unit is more than 1 year old and you haven't had your HVAC unit serviced recently, you may want to do so before its too late.

Prep your Deck

Time to get the deck ready to host your summer cookouts.

- Remove all of the furniture from the deck and sweep all of the leaves and dirt off the deck.
- Using a deck cleaner, scrub the deck to remove any mold or mildew that may have accumulated over the winter. Be sure to rinse it off so it doesn't damage the wood.
- Pay attention to how the water reacts to the deck. If the water beads up on the deck, it is still protected. If the water is absorbed, its time to reseal your deck. Sealing your deck will prevent it from deteriorating and beginning to rot.
- While you are cleaning your deck, go ahead and clean any outdoor furniture you
 have on the deck as well. If it is wooden, go ahead and seal it while you are sealing the deck.



Prep your Yard

Remove any remaining yard debris including sticks and leaves from your yard. Leaving them may prevent the grass from growing.
Begin cutting the grass so that it can begin growing and absorbing the sunlight.

- You may need to fertilize your lawn.
- Treat any ant hills.

• Add another layer of mulch in your flower beds to help hold the moisture in during the hot summer months.

- Trim any dead branches from your bushes, shrubs, and trees.
- Knock down all of the spiderwebs in your doorways and around your windows.
- Carpenter bees can be annoying in the spring and early summer and cause damage to any wooden structures. Purchase a carpenter bee trap to prevent damage.

Sta'Brayan, her son, never wants to leave his new house. He enjoys being able to play in the yard, ride his bike and explore the Butterfly Branch Greenway.

Shunda's story is one like many others of our homeowners—rental property with

issues, single parent, and wanting more for her family. To add to the story, Shunda was no longer able to work when she applied for the program.

Since joining the program, Shunda has volunteered to represent Habitat Spartanburg as a speaker at the annual golf tournament, participate in the Wofford Interim class on Affordable Housing, and now she has gone back to school to begin a new career.

The Tate family home dedication was held on March 28, 2024 at 4pm.

Who Is P.E.O.?

P.E.O or Philanthropic Educational Organization is a women's organization with over 230,000 members dedicated to supporting and promoting education for women through scholarships, grants and other programs. Spartanburg P.E.O. is one of 46 Chapters in South Carolina and supports six international projects including the P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education.

The P.E.O Program for Continuing education was established in 1973 as a needs-based grant program providing one-time financial assistance to women whose education was interrupted and find it necessary to return to school to complete a degree or certification that will improve their marketable skills for employment and increase the financial support of themselves and their families. The money is intended as a grant-in-aid for educational related expenses including tuition, books, supplies, transportation, childcare while in class, required uniforms, testing fees, and equipment or tools. It cannot be used for living expenses or to repay educational loans or personal debt. The maximum grant is \$3,000.00 and funds are available based on the current year's grant budget and the applicant's individual needs.

- A woman may be eligible if she:
- Is recommended by a P.E.O Chapter
- Is enrolled in a certification or degree program from an accredited institution.
- Has not already completed a Master's Degree.
- Is a citizen or legal resident of the U.S. or Canada.
- Has had at least 24 consecutive months as a non-student sometime during her adult life.
- Is within 18 months of completing her education program.
- Is enrolled in an educational program which, at the conclusion, will lead to employment or job advancement.

Carolyn's Corner

The goal of Carolyn's Corner is to give recommendations on products and services that may be helpful to you as a homeowner. This issue features budgeting apps and high yield savings accounts.

Budgeting Apps: Do you want to have a budget, but the process of writing it all down and tracking your expenses is too much work? There's an app (or three) for that! In fact, your bank may offer the service for free. If your bank doesn't offer it, give an app a try. These apps can be connected to your bank account and credit cards to automatically track your spending and stay on track.

- Rocket Money
 – Best Feature: Goal Setting can set up a savings account for you and automatically transfer funds to an
 FDIC insured savings account. Cost: \$10/month.
- Monarch Money
 – Best Feature: Uses the secure platform Plaid to connect to your accounts for additional security, plus
 customizable dashboard. Cost: \$9/month
- NerdWallet: Best Feature: Website comes with informative articles on managing your money. Cost: Free!

High Yield Savings Accounts are similar to regular savings accounts, but you make more money in interest! That's free money! If you are looking to set aside extra savings for emergencies, retirement, or a large purchase in the near future (hello vacation 2024!), this type of account could help you meet your goal. You can check the bank you already use, or you can look at:

- CapitalOne: An online bank with a no-frills platform, and a great interest rate. Rates vary, but currently are at 4.35%
- Ally Bank: An online bank with a great interest rate (currently 4.25%), and customization options. You can have one
 account with multiple "Buckets" for different savings goals. You can also set up "Surprise Savings" which will
 automatically draft small amounts from your checking account to boost your savings.
