First Presbyterian, Billy Painter Memorial Golf Tournament Sponsoring 2 Homes

Habitat for Humanity of Spartanburg has been blessed over the past 32 years with sponsors — corporate, faith, individual, schools, foundations and government agencies — who believe in our mission of lifting deserving, low-income families out of substandard rental housing and into a home of their own — realizing the dream of homeownership.

The backbone of our work is the many faithful volunteers and the lifeblood of our work are the sponsors.

Two homes currently under construction on Salem Street near the Duncan Park Neighborhood. The home

at 123 Salem St. is generously sponsored by First Presbyterian Church — Habitat Spartanburg's longest and most faithful supporter.

This home will be the new home of Cherelle Beam and her daughter. Cherelle is an associate at the Dollar General Distribution



Center and her coworkers have volunteered on her home.

The home at 125 Salem Street is sponsored by two years of proceeds from the Billy L. Painter Memorial Golf Tournament. This will be the new home of Tangeline Graham, her son, daughter, uncle and niece. Tangeline is a medical technician at the Spartanburg County Detention Center, where she has worked for two years.

"My life — and the life of my daughter — is about to change dramatically forever thanks to Habitat for Humanity," Cherelle said. "We no longer have to be afraid. We no longer have to pay rent. This is a lifelong investment."

Tangeline said her new home will be a blessing — and she will pay the acts of kindness forward.

Dear Friends,

So much has happened in the time since our last newsletter - homes 134 and 135 are currently under construction in Duncan Park just off Lucerne Drive. We are elated to build one of these homes in memory of Billy L. Painter, a long time servant of Spartanburg and especially of Habitat. The Billy L. Painter Memorial Golf Tournament has raised funds over the past two years to build this home. The other home is the 16th Habitat home fully funded by First Presbyterian Church and we are deeply grateful for this long time support from one of our original faith partners.

As mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter, we are blessed with long time faithful sponsors of homes as well as new sponsors. We are in the final stage of completion on the 10° Denny's Habitat Home and are grateful beyond measure to Denny's Corporation for giving back to this community. The JM Smith Foundation continues to bless Habitat in support of our work, and this year brought us a new faith partner, Inman First Baptist Church! Our first home in Inman was built by Inman First on a lot donated by Inman Mills. We continue to reach beyond the Spartanburg metro area to serve more communities.

Our first ever CEO Build brought support from The Milliken Foundation, The Johnson Group, Denny's, JM Smith Foundation, BMW, CONTEC, Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System, and the United Way of the Piedmont Leaders of all these sponsors were present for the wall raising and illustrated the community support we enjoy in Spartanburg. Additionally, we were blessed with sponsorship of a home in the past year by the Wade Family Fund, and received support from education with funds from Pauline-Glenn Springs Elementary (yes, elementary students raised funds to help build a home!) and from Boiling Springs High School.

After much planning and effort, we have begun offering Critical Home Repair services and have completed three projects, with several applications in process. We plan to offer exterior repairs such as roofing, porch repair, ramps, etc. to assist homeowners who may no longer be able to maintain their homes as needed. We hope this will open new ways to serve in the neighborhoods where we build as well as serve our veteran population.

Work to support our neighborhoods continues as well. Workshops are offered monthly on maintenance, lawn care, decorating, pest & snake safety and many other topics. Our residents and homeowners in process have participated in Finance and Homebuyer Education classes with great results. Recruitment has been successful with hard work by the Family Selection Committee and we now have seven homeowner families in the Sweat Equity process and several applications in process.

The Habitat ReStore is a place of ministry and we give thanks to donors of excellent goods and faithful customers who understand why the ReStore exists. Revenues have grown steadily for six years. We are seeking to make some site improvements to alleviate parking congestion and improve the customer experience. It is a happy place with courteous associates; well run, clean, organized, and uplifting.

Our staff and board are renewing the Strategic Plan to put resources in place for greater growth in new home construction as well as our new Critical Home Repair program. To fund growth, we are considering for the first time a possible major gifts program either in the form of a capital funds campaign or a planned giving campaign. I can never give thanks enough for the special spirit of the stakeholders in Habitat for Humanity of Spartanburg. Our donors, volunteers, partner families and the incredibly dedicated staff give their all every day to deliver performance which makes us proud to be part of this ministry. I offer my sincere thanks to all of you, for in some way you are a part of this ministry and I am grateful to be a part of this mission.



2018 Women Build

Habitat for Humanity of Spartanburg is committed to improving the lives of individuals and families who work hard and have the desire to lift their families out of substandard rental housing into a home of their own.

Many Habitat homes are led by single mothers who want a better life for their children — one in which they can grow, succeed in school, play in a safe yard and neighborhood, and flourish as a family.

Women Build projects allow females to work shoulder-to-shoulder with other females and Habitat families, learning new skills while empowering other women to achieve the dream of homeownership. Women Build projects provide opportunities for hands-on learning and allow women the opportunity to transform lives — and neighborhoods.

This year, the JM Smith Foundation and Boiling Springs High School sponsored the Women Build Habitat Home, which is now owned by Rosaura Gallegos and her family. Individual supporters Maureen Johannigman and Dr. Annamaria Kish also made generous gifts toward Women Build 2018.

Habitat Homeowner Cindy Johnson: Homeless No Longer

Cindy Johnson is one of seven Habitat homeowners in 2018 who achieved their lifelong dream of homeownership

Cindy Johnson is a single mother of three sons who left an unhealthy marriage eight years ago. She moved to Spartanburg to be closer to family and to start fresh, but she knew she would have her share of struggles.

"It was a challenge," Cindy said. "One of my sons had health issues that took a team to deal with and we set our goals and moved forward one step at time."

Cindy and her sons were homeless and through the Spartanburg

Interfaith Hospitality Network (SPIHN), they lived in churches a week at a time.

"That was tough, but we were so thankful to have SPIHN," Cindy said. "I made up my mind that no matter where we were, I would keep my boys enrolled at the same school, I would keep them in therapy and keep them in Boy Scouts. No matter how far I had to drive, I vowed to do those things."

Cindy eventually received a Section 8 housing voucher and lived in an apartment and applied for the homeownership program.

"What a blessing that was the day I found out I had been accepted," Cindy said. "I had worked for so long – and had so many people supporting and helping me along the way."

When her sons went out-of-state to visit their father during the summer, Cindy started volunteering at Habitat — while she was still homeless.

"I got to know the volunteers – they are wonderful – and I knew I wanted a Habitat home for myself and my boys," Cindy said. "Setting goals has been key for me – I set goals and people in Spartanburg in various agencies have helped me and it has

Habitat Spartanburg Begins Critical Home Repairs

A primary strategic goal of Habitat for Humanity in Spartanburg is to help homeowners remain in their homes and preserve Spartanburg's older housing stock. Many Spartanburg County homeowners are unable to pay for critical home repairs such as roof work and wheelchair ramps.

Our goal is to assist homeowners who need critical home repair services and allow those homeowners to live in their home while work is com-

pleted. In addition, making much-needed improvements allows homes in Spartanburg's oldest neighborhoods to retain their value and keep those neighborhoods intact.

Habitat Spartanburg has opened its Critical Home Repair application process and will prioritize applications from veterans and homeowners who live in the areas of Habitat's focus: Northside, Highlands, Spartanburg Regional Neighborhood and South Converse Street Neighborhood. Applicants must be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident, have owned and lived in their home for the past two years (mobile homes don't qualify



for this program) and meet specific income guidelines. Habitat staff will evaluate an applicant's income at no charge when the application is submitted.

Applicants must be current on all housing cost payments including their mortgage and property taxes and have the ability to make a one-time payment to cover 10 percent of the total repair costs.

"The Critical Home Repair program is a service the Board of Directors and staff have felt led to provide for several years," said Executive Director Lee Close. "The program makes sense for us because we have the capacity and staff. Other nonprofits already provide similar services, but we know there is great need out there, so we're attempting to fill a much-needed service gap."
